

Dear HPC Friends and Family,

There's so much to celebrate here at HPC these days...and we'll be doing a lot of that in May. May 6 worship will celebrate teachers, scholars, and victors. Please plan to attend worship that day and the cake and reception afterwards. May 20 we celebrate the birth of the church – Pentecost – please your NC State friends by asking them for a red shirt to wear. Mission will host a potluck lunch afterwards, which means they'll clean up – yay!!!, and give us mission updates to celebrate as well. Then, Memorial Day is a celebration of our country's military sacrifices and the start of summer schedules. God is giving us many reasons to rejoice and we should take advantage of them all.

I know many of you are waiting to celebrate the formation of a Pastor Nominating Committee. Alas, another month goes by without that celebration. And yet, I urge you to listen to the voices of your fellow members this month suggesting there still might be a reason to celebrate. Take time to read the Mission Study Report from David Remington on page four for one of the most succinct explanations of a very good reason to do a Mission Study. I would expound on David's explanation a bit by making an analogy to the "rebound effect." (Imagine what the presidential election might have been like if we'd had an interim president for eighteen months before electing the installed president.) By having a time when churches inventory themselves and their communities to seek God's leading, a church is invited to base their call to a new pastor out of a sense of who they really are, based on factual information, and where they think God is calling them to go, based on information learned about community needs and opportunities. Very often the basis for a call to a new pastor looks like a presidential election – either get somebody *totally different* from who we had before, or get somebody *just like* we had before. Neither option for the selection of a candidate is healthy or forward-looking; it isn't based in current reality of the community's situation or a shared vision for the future. A Mission Study seeks to provide the church a call process based on both.

I also direct you to Lisa Watts' article on all the work that HPC did after the Cottage Meetings in 2014 and the World Café meetings last year. The Mission Study Team has spent a lot of time looking over the results of conversations with you and the desires you expressed – and we discovered an amazing number of accomplishments. If some of you feel tired there is good reason why!

So we celebrate both the accomplishments from all the work over the last four years, and we continue to work on trusting God in a process that is not neat and linear and easy to map out. I pointed out to the Mission Study Team at our last meeting that this process isn't easy for the interim pastor either. It would be a lot easier just to "babysit" congregations while they did a search for a new pastor. Remember, an interim pastor is going through the same discernment process the church is. We don't know what our future holds, either. I am having to trust God that once my work at HPC is done, another congregation within driving distance of Raleigh, impatient to call its next pastor, will call me expecting me to make that happen sooner rather than later. But all that must be revealed in God's time, not ours. Together we go forward in faith, trusting God in a process that reveals – far too slowly to us – God's will for us, the path of Christ, the inward journey that takes us, convicted and redeemed, out into the world. Something to celebrate, indeed!





May 6<sup>th</sup>, **Being Mortal: Medicine and What Matters in the End** by Atul Gawande

(Note that this meeting date is the *first*, rather than the usual *second* Sunday of the month, to accommodate Mothers' Day)

Named a Best Book of the Year by The Washington Post, The New York Times Book Review, NPR, and Chicago Tribune. *Medicine has triumphed in modern times, transforming the dangers of childbirth, injury, and disease from harrowing to manageable. But when it comes to the inescapable realities of aging and death, what medicine can do often runs counter to what it should. Through eye-opening research and gripping stories of his own patients and family, Gawande reveals the suffering this dynamic has produced. Nursing homes, devoted above all to safety, battle with residents over the food they are allowed to eat and the choices they are allowed to make. Doctors, uncomfortable discussing patients' anxieties about death, fall back on false hopes and treatments that are actually shortening lives instead of improving them. In his bestselling books, Atul Gawande, a practicing surgeon, has fearlessly revealed the struggles of his profession. Now he examines its ultimate limitations and failures-in his own practices as well as others'-as life draws to a close. Riveting, honest, and humane, Being Mortal shows how the ultimate goal is not a good death but a good life-all the way to the very end.*

### ACCOMPLISHMENTS FROM OUR HPC COTTAGE MEETINGS

One of the Mission Study Team's many tasks has been revisiting the work done by HPC in the Cottage Meetings and World Café sessions, held in 2013 and 2017. Much of the discussion in these meetings was centered on "wish lists" for Hillsborough Presbyterian. The MST was impressed with how many of these desires have come to fruition. Some took intense contributions of time and money, such as the day-long celebration of our 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary and the creation of an accessible, updated building. Others have focused on enhancing church life: more participation and variety in the music program, additional outdoor worship services, a youth program with dedicated leadership. Other accomplishments involve service to others, such as more local mission opportunities and increased attention to international communities. The church's leadership responded to many of the congregational requests noted during conversations with those who participated in the meetings.

When the MST begins calling congregational gatherings, we won't be discussing the same ground covered in the Cottage and World Cafe meetings. While those gave voice to desires of the congregation, our efforts are to bring the reality of who we are today (number of people, size of budget and staff, condition of building and programs) with the reality of who the Hillsborough community is. The better we understand our current reality, the better we will hear God's call to become a witness to the Kingdom in this reality. There will always be more needs than the church can fulfill. Which of these needs best serves the community and best helps HPC live God's unique calling to us? No one person or group can answer these questions, but we are confident that the congregation will work together to answer them with prayerful consideration and attention to Scripture.

**MISSION STUDY TEAM UPDATE**

The Mission Study Team continues to meet twice monthly, and has been preparing to conduct the community study that is part of the mission study process. We have compiled a list of leaders in local and county government, business, and other facets of community life, who will be interviewed about their current joys and concerns for the community, their hopes for the future and challenges they anticipate, and the role they see for faith communities in that picture. We expect to recruit other members of the congregation to help conduct these interviews.

We will use information from the community study, demographic study, and congregational input (including comments on the timeline in Strudwick Hall, the cottage and World Café meetings from a few years ago) to plan and schedule the congregational meetings that will be the heart of the mission study process. In these meetings, we expect to be asking difficult questions about who we are as a congregation and where we see God leading us in the future in order to formulate a new vision, goals and objectives going forward.

Many of you are asking, “Why do we need to be going through this lengthy process? Can’t we just get on with things and recruit a new permanent pastor?” The answer is twofold. First, we need a shared vision of who we are so that we know what we are looking for in a new pastor. Second, prospective pastoral candidates will want to have a clear idea of who we are before they apply. A careful mission study process is an essential part of attracting the best pastoral candidates to guide us forward as Christ’s people in the coming decades.

Christian Education commission has some exciting news for the 2018-19 Sunday school year. Scott is going to continue with the Joyful Noise choir on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Sundays of the month. He will teach your children about music and prepare them for the monthly anthem and special programs presentations. After he finishes the choir lesson, children will be given a brief Sunday School lesson before they are released to their parents at 10:45 am. Your children have brought back a wonderful sound in our church. Thank you for supporting this choir!

After much time and effort discerning the best course for Sunday School classes on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Sundays, the CE commission decided schedule all Sunday School classes for 9:45 am. CE decided to make this time change because we wanted to encourage families to worship together on Sundays. Recent literature has supported this. We need to teach our children that worship is an integral part of their community of faith and that a child is an important part of HPC's faith community. We believe that sharing worship with their parents will help our children understand the importance of attending church to support their lifelong journey developing their Christian faith. Yes, we might hear the rustle of paper, crinkle of snack packages and a cry or whine but, importantly, this means children are present in our church learning how to pray, sing and worship with their families. Our children will learn they are welcome to share in the Word and sacraments of our faith.

For families that have infants and children under 3 yo, there will be nursery offered from 9:45 am through 11:00 service. For families who have children 4yo-3<sup>rd</sup> grade and feel they are not ready to participate in the entire worship service there will be "Kid's Time" following the Children's Sermon. Kid's Time will have bible lessons and activities in Room #204, adjacent to the Nursery downstairs. We will also have worship bags for children who remain in church that will have a variety of activities and bible stories to quietly read while in the service.

The Sunday School classes will be: Youth 6<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade; 4yo - 1<sup>st</sup> grade; and 2<sup>nd</sup> - 5<sup>th</sup> grades. The new Sunday school curriculum "Feasting on the Word", is lectionary-based. The lessons will provide an understanding for that week's scripture reading for both Sunday school and our worship service. CE hopes that this will provide families an opportunity to

have discussions at home about that Sunday's faith message.

Our adult Sunday school class will continue at 9:45 am in the multi-purpose classroom on the first floor. The class is taught by Linda Jaubert. Adults of all ages are welcome.

CE commission hopes that your family will continue to support the Christian education and faith building activities at HPC. Christian education is a lifelong process of learning, believing, growing, and serving in our Christian community.

## HPC Stewardship Moment – Choosing to Share God’s Love

I appreciate you all granting me the privilege to share my personal thoughts, feelings, emotions. Since, Katherine and I begin this journey I have discovered new appreciations for my wife, our life, health, family and friends. I have been blessed with many great life experiences which has shaped my growth and maturation. Which I must admit still does not come close to my actual age. In this, I have had the great fortune of being taught and lead by many strong women in my life. As a father I am aware of the influences in my life and realize how true the adage “It takes a village to raise a child”. That certainly applies to me and I am thankful for the women in my life that have instilled those values and character in me.

As I reflect on Katherine’s cancer diagnosis I came to the realization that this new journey in life is somewhat analogous to sports and in particular baseball. I generally don’t share these personal thoughts in written form but we are all friends and family here.

Currently, I view this moment in our life and its relationship to baseball. In the past few years the Chicago Cubs attributed their success during their 2016 World Series campaign as to just “grinding it out”. You may know of all the Cubs hope, expectations and angst of not winning in over 100 years. After they won all the players repeated how they accepted the grind of the season. They used the previous year’s loss and disappointment as inspiration for the 2016 season. This came from their manager Joe Maddon (not John Madden – he’s the football guy). At the beginning of the 2016 season Joe Maddon coined the phrase “*Embrace the Suck*”. Apologies to those of you who may be offended by the slang but this was to get players’ attention and change their mindset of facing a long grueling season; rather than let it drag on and pull you down. Get on top of it, own it, be in control, take charge, stay positive. Life in general is a grind much like a baseball season. Certainly baseball has a definitive beginning and end. Life, like each season adds a new year. The teams all start with the same record and expectation of winning it all. Along the way comes the realization that only one team will be the champion. Teams face adversity, injuries, trades, setbacks, ups and downs, sadness, the agony of defeat, victory, challenges, and so on. Hence, I have worked to practice Joe Maddon’s challenge in our lives. Marguerite certainly delivered a more comprehensive message in her sermon Sunday, April 15, 2018 focusing on embracing “suffering”. “Embracing the suck” (or suffering) is not easy. Katherine and I have a strong foundation and are blessed with an amazing support system and church family. This makes “embracing the suffering” much easier – at times. My grandmother (Granny) taught me how to “embrace the suffering”, finding hope in life, having a strong relationship with God, looking for the silver lining. She is a strong woman. I have missed her during this transition in life. The ability to talk with her, knowing in advance what she would say to me if present. Still I long to hear her voice, her loving and soothing words, reassuring me that God’s will would prevail. Indicating God’s will may not be what we want but trust in God, grow in relationship with God and seek his word in scripture and prayer. God’s love, which I often see is that of a Mother’s love, has also helped me to “embrace the suffering”. Over time I see his words in Psalm 23 reassuring of his presence in my (our) life through the peaks (highs) and valleys (lows). Comforting, reassuring. It has not been easy to “embrace this suffering”. Even though I came to accept this analogy and use it to pull me through it has been hard at times. At times! It has not owned me, pulled me down or kept me from enjoying life. At most, I shed a few tears, stress ate and it delayed an email.

To Katherine, I thank you for the strong, courageous woman you are. For being strong enough for both of us. For being stronger than you know and inspiring me to “embrace the suffering”. For the many times you do not even know when I’ve wanted to stop and feel sad/sorry/lament. You encourage me to move forward through your actions and positive, loving spirit. You have unknowingly carried me along as you take on the decision making for your health and well-being, your work, family and personal responsibilities. Living in the moment and looking toward the future together. Doing what is best for you, us and our family. You are the greatest person to ever happen to me. I do not welcome this diagnosis. But I do *embrace* it as an opportunity to strengthen our love and appreciation for each other.

Again, thank you for your time, support and prayers. I value your listening, reading and allowing me the opportunity to express my thoughts, feelings and emotions. I appreciate the ability to openly share my emotions with those I am close. That too is a trait I learned for a strong woman, my mother.




